"Be Safe" Initiative at Bedlington Station

I have arranged for a visiting professional to work with some of our older children for an hour in school over the past few weeks. The focus has been on Anti-Bullying Awareness and has been developed to educate young people on how to recognise various forms of bullying and how best to deal with it, should it occur. You will know that school already has measures in place to tackle this such as our Behaviour Management programme, Rainbow Station, Bubble Time and the work Mrs Johnston and Mrs Rozgowska carry out with children and families. In addition, our Anti-Bullying Policy has been reviewed and is on our website should you need to refer to it. These workshops are an additional tool to support children in making the right choices around friendships, exploring what bullying means and what it looks like and informing them how to stand up to it and deal with any situation that may arise. The gentleman delivering the courses has worked with many schools in the area including Stead Lane and has been highly recommended.

Years 5 and 4 had their session in March and April respectively and it was the turn of Year 6 on Monday 15th May.

The have been differentiated slightly in content depending on the age to ensure they are appropriate. The children have responded very positively to them I think they will be very valuable for the children as they enhance and augment our PSHE and reinforce some of the messages that we have been giving to the children through this academic year. My aim is then to tailor some of these workshops for some of our younger children so that they are able to hear a similar, age-appropriate message.

Operation Encompass

I thought it would be helpful to remind you about Operation Encompass, which has now been running across Northumberland since the beginning of April and follows my letter to all parents and carers at that time. Operation Encompass is a new innovative project in which schools in Northumberland are participating, and which is run in partnership with Northumberland County Council and Northumbria Police. Many other Local Authorities both nationally and locally have successfully implemented Operation Encompass.

Operation Encompass which commenced 3rd April 2017, aims to support children and young people who are affected by domestic abuse. Witnessing domestic abuse is really distressing for a child or young person, who often see the abuse, hear it from another room, see a parent's injuries or distress afterwards or can be physically hurt by trying to stop the abuse. As a result, following any domestic abuse incident being reported to the police, the Police will make contact with Children's Social Care who will then communicate relevant and necessary information to nominated school staff. This will ensure that the school is made aware at the earliest possible opportunity and can subsequently provide support to children in a way that means they feel safe and listened to.

Each school has members of staff (key adults) who have been fully trained in liaising with police and Children's Social Care when required, and will ensure that the necessary support is made available to the child or young person following the disclosure of a domestic abuse incident.

I believe that this project demonstrates our school's commitment to working in partnership to safeguard and protect children, and to providing the best possible care and support for our pupils.
