Parent View – Tell Us What You Think

Have you given your views about our school on Parent View yet? Parent View gives you the chance to tell Ofsted what you think about your child's school, from the quality of teaching to dealing with bullying and poor behaviour. The survey can be completed at any time; you don't have to wait until the school is being inspected. The process is very simple. All you need to do is to access the website at <u>www.parentview.ofsted.gov.uk</u> and register. There will be 12 questions to answer, for example, 'My child is happy at this school' with a choice of responses:

- Strongly agree
- Agree
- Disagree
- Strongly disagree
- Don't know

Use the 'Next' button to move to the next question. If you change your mind you can use the 'Previous' button to go back.

Once you have completed all 12 questions, click on 'Finish the survey' and the questionnaire is complete.

I hope that all the children will respect this rule and understand the reason why it is in place.

Show Racism the Red Card

On Monday 22nd February, our Year 5 and 6 children took part in "Show Racism The Red Card" training. Show Racism the Red Card is an anti-racism educational charity established in 1996. They work in schools throughout England delivering anti-racism workshops to more than 20,000 young people every year. Their team of educators and ex-professional football players play a vital role in educating young people against racism. Workshop Aims

- To educate young people about the causes and consequences of racism and to explore the various forms racism can take.
- To empower young people to challenge racism in the communities in which they live, providing them with relevant knowledge and information to enable them to do this.
- To help young people prepare to play an active role as citizens in an increasingly multi-cultural society.
- To enable young people to develop good relationships and respect the differences between people, regardless of their ethnicity, faith, culture or nationality.

All the children took a great deal from the sessions which were interactive and very informative. Year 4 children will also be given the chance to access this initiative in the coming weeks and I very much hope that they engage with the training in the same way.
